# **Additional Items**



## Winter Recreation Strategy

- Implemented as a pandemic initiative in the winter of 2020.
- Provides enhanced service levels to parks, trails and outdoor amenities to enable greater use for recreation and leisure activities in winter months.
- Funded temporarily through tax stabilization funds until March 2025.
- Report will be coming to council, in April 2025, to seek direction on whether to continue the program on a permanent basis.



## **Outstanding Councillor Budget Inquiries**

#### **Bronte Waterfront**

- 1. Staff report on winter activity options for Bronte Waterfront area
- 2. Staff explore and report back on developing a Bronte waterfront vision & masterplan in 2025 as we work towards accommodating many waterfront elements, such as a harbours business plan, acquisition of federal lands and Greb property, accommodating TOWARF, repurposing Metro Marine, exploring winter activities, restoring our lighthouse, beach improvement and more.

#### **Response:**

Bronte Waterfront Master Plan will address these items within the anticipated scope of that plan, if approved within the proposed 2026 Budget.
