Two houses – each is one-and-a-half stories, clad in stone. One has side gable roof, other has gable end roof. One has a front porch, the other does not. Both are asymmetrical.

The Smith houses are stone clad vernacular buildings. The older was constructed in 1911 and generally reflects the architecture of the Smith family's ancestral homes in Scotland. The newer was constructed in 1930 and is vernacular with Craftsman influences.
